

Or, I can understand how the other characters in the stories relate and react to them.

Barabbas – Freed from sin through the grace of Jesus


**Pilate** – Callous, hardened heart

As we approach the celebration of Easter morning, it's often hard to remember all the lessons of Lent. On Easter morning when we are shouting our "Alleluia's" and singing with joy, we don't want to remember that we don't always live up to Jesus hopes for us. Those reminders of guilt and fear and sometimes our unwillingness to allow our hearts to be changed by the love of Christ are happily pushed away Easter morning.



But for me, those reminders we have been given throughout this worship series are even more meaningful because of Jesus resurrection and what that means for each of us. The gift of grace and mercy and salvation we have all been given through Jesus death and resurrection are made even more powerful and profound **because** we know we are not perfect. We do make mistakes – and continue to! And Jesus knows that!

Just as Jesus knew all his disciples would abandon and betray him, Jesus knows we will continue to do and say things that will make him unhappy. But just as Jesus continued to love the disciples and showed up for them after his resurrection, Jesus will continue to love us and show up in our lives now. If anything, all of these stories during Lent have shown that Jesus never turns his back on us, no matter how many times we stray from what he wants us to do and

be.

I hope and pray that as we all celebrate Jesus resurrection on Easter morning, we remember that Jesus love surrounds us and remains with us always. May Jesus love truly enter us and change our hearts so that we show his love in all we say and do. May the light and love of Jesus shine from you on Easter and every day.

#### A TIME FOR A RESET

In the first seven chapters of <u>Genesis</u>, we move quickly from the glory of creation to disobedience, expulsion from the garden and fratricide to the wickedness of humankind. We read, "The Lord saw that the wickedness of humankind was great in the earth, and that every inclination of the thoughts of their hearts was only evil continually" (Genesis 6:5). God's beautiful creation, in harmony with itself and its creator, had gone completely off the rails. God had given the creation as a gift—and the gift was rejected. Time for a reset.

"And the Lord was sorry that he had made humankind on the earth, and it grieved him to his heart. So the Lord said, 'I will blot out from the earth the human beings I have created—people together with animals and creeping things and birds of the air, for I am sorry I have made them'" (Genesis 6:6-7). Then, in chapter 7, we get the flood.

This is a story of God's deep and terrible pain. We were created by love for love. And now this terrible betrayal moves God to destroy God's own precious creation. Another part of this tragedy is that human disobedience and arrogance resulted in the destruction of creation. It is too deep for me to understand the depth of God's horror when beholding how twisted humankind had become and God's agony in sending the flood.

Some days—or if I am honest, many days—I want to press the reset button. We are still stuck in this pandemic. The whole world is anxious and angry and grieving. And though the world is living through this together, not all people are affected equally. Some (I among them) have access to vaccines, medical care, a safe home in which to shelter and the privilege of working from home. And this is just one pandemic.

I want to hold out the truth and the promise of God's ultimate reset—the death and resurrection of Jesus.

There is the continuing pandemic of racial inequity. When I say the Pledge of Allegiance, I want to believe that we are a people "with liberty and justice for all." Whether we see the racial inequities laid bare, feel freedom threatened by mask and vaccine mandates, or see voting rights threatened—all positions voiced by members of this church—it is painfully clear that we aren't living up to that pledge. There are societal forces that seek to tear us apart and set us against each other. And as I write this, Russia appears to be on the brink of <u>invading Ukraine</u> and plunging Europe into war.

Over and over again humankind has betrayed the hope God has for us. God declared the creation very good. We have fallen short. This must certainly be a time for a reset. I can think about how I would reset. Many others in our church who have been wounded by society, and even the ELCA, would have legitimate cases for what needs to be reset. And I wonder, if all of us simultaneously pressed the reset button, would that cancel all of us out?

And God said to Noah, "I establish my covenant with you, that never again shall all flesh be cut off by the waters of a flood, and never again shall there be a flood to destroy the earth (Genesis 9:11). The rainbow, interestingly, is the sign of this covenant with all of creation, a rainbow that only comes after a storm. This is God's reset.

We are in a storm. In no way would I minimize nor silence the real pain experienced by our people. But I want to hold out the truth and the promise of God's ultimate reset—the death and resurrection of Jesus. In this act of redemption, God has brought about the reconciliation of all people and of all creation. This reset, though not completely realized, gives us a way to speak and hear truth from one another.

Jesus said, "You will know the truth, and the truth will make you free." (John 8:32).

# PARISH NURSE UPDATE

All of us have some kind of balance issues. It can start in young adulthood. What's the cause? There is an interaction of three primary sensory systems. The first if visual. It cues us Parish Nurse of where & what is around us. Think of standing straight with your eyes closed. It can cause you to lose some of your balance. The second is our sense of feel and touch as well as a sense of where our body is in a space. The third is "vestibular". That is the very sensitive inner ear system that responds to gravity. Input from all three keep us in balance. When one is off if may through you off balance. As we age, even as young as our 30's, just like everything else, these systems can fade. There are some exercises you can do to improve some of the issues you may be having.

<u>Spine Alignment</u>- Stand with your back against a wall, heels touching and shoulder blades and back of your head all touch the wall. If you are like most people, this will take some practice. Take a 36" foam roll or a rolled up beach towel and place it on the floor, then lie on it lengthwise with knees bent, so your head, spine and tailbone are all touching the roll. Stretch your arms from your sides and lie there about 5 minutes, allowing your shoulder blades to pull down on either side. Try practicing this twice a day until you are able to line up. <u>Stationary Lunges</u>- Start with feet hip-width apart. Step forward one leg, lower the other knee bent into a lunge. Keep your back straight. Repeat on the other leg.

<u>Single Leg Romanian Deadlifts</u>- Again stand with feel hip-width apart. Try to balance on one leg. If you feel unsteady, begin by putting one foot about 2 foot lengths behind the other. Both knees should be slightly bent. Maintain a straight back, hinging from the hips while reaching forward with both arms extended toward the floor. Hold as you are able and then repeat on the other side.

Of course, it is ideal to work with a trainer. I have seen in the past that the YMCA in Custer had such classes. Please tell me when they start the next one as I really need to go to one of them. There are other things to try as well to improve balance. Tai Chi has been known to be of benefit. Also we are fortunate to have Yoga classes, more basic and can be done using a chair, led by someone from our congregation right here at church. PS- you will be seeing me begin there again as soon as I am able. You see, due to poor balance, I broke my arm in a "freak accident" where I lost balance.

Sherry Broderick and Jessica Lillebo from LSS were our speakers at our February meeting. Sherry is the manager of the LSS program that works to help the youth in Rapid City who are runaways or homeless. Much of the information that she shared as far as living conditions for these young people was hard to imagine. Sherry does the best that she can to help individuals get what they need to get through a night or a day. She offers encouragement as well as simple necessities such as toothpaste, water and granola bars. The simple necessities are contained in "blessing bags" that are handy for Sherry to pass

out and can easily be carried in a backpack. The bags can act as a conversation starter as they are offered. They also are a tangible way for the youth to know that someone cares about them.

In November, W/ELCA donated items to be placed in the blessing bags. After listening to Sherry's presentation in February, we sent \$160 to LSS for items to be purchased for the blessing bags as needed. It is just one small way to help a program that is huge in what it offers.

In March, our speaker was Lori Burnham from Monument Health. Lori told us about the volunteer program at the hospital. Folks are needed to visit with and to provide simple activities for patients. There is also a need for folks to do simple sewing projects. Those projects include stuffing neck pillows and sewing them shut. Some of our members will be helping with those tasks.

# **Custer Quilters Assist with Refugee Crisis**

This week, 15 guilts made by women from the Custer Community Church and Custer Lutheran Fellowship arrived at an ORPHAN GRAIN TRAIN Distribution Center in Clemson, IA. The guilts will be joining hundreds of other quilts, packed into a shipping crate, and then sent to a Ukrainian refugee location in Poland.

Lois Wells had been told of this humanitarian mission by relatives in Iowa. She says, "Quilts are symbols of love and caring. Our hearts go out to the millions of refugees escaping the Russian invasion of the country of Ukraine. These people have only the clothes on their backs and their children in their arms."

"The ORPHAN GRAIN TRAIN organization of many volunteers uses 98.2 of all donations directly for causes such as this latest refugee crisis. For us, the nearest ORPHAN GRAIN TRAIN Distribution Center is in Norfolk, NE.

Leaders there are hoping to charter a cargo plane to get supplies mor quickly to Poland. To find out more about this group, Custer people can google the site.
