PARSONAGE SIDING PROJECT — AN ACT OF PROPERTY STEWARDSHIP (COMPLETED)

On July 19, a crew of workers (in baseball terms, the "closers") were delighted to complete the final steps of the parsonage exterior siding project. They leveled soil, placed landscape fabric, installed 74 edger blocks, loaded and spread 3 tons of decorative rock, replaced fencing, and fixed a garage door seal. Thirty (30) volunteers contributed over 640 hours of labor to replace the siding, trim, painting and the landscaping (exterior) portion of the parsonage project.

Joy Smolnisky, Treasurer, reported that interior <u>and</u> exterior renovations totaled \$31, 439 for materials (82% from the capital account and 18% donation). Volunteer labor for the entire project totaled 1,240 hours with an estimated value of \$43,000. She noted "...this is an incredible example of time and talent pooled together as a unit of God's hands.

Coordinator Dave Thom quipped, "...why should all the quilter and WELCA ladies get to have all the fun doing service work; us guys can get work done and have conversations, too!" Pastor Shannon added, "Darryn and I truly appreciate all the work that went into the parsonage." Bonnie Thompson offered, "a HUGE thank you to everyone who sacrificed their time to work on the parsonage project. You are servants of God and the best role models for others. "God's Work Our Hands"!!

The interior renovations started in December concluding in March 2023. Siding replacement started in April. The parsonage was constructed largely with volunteers in 1991.

GOD'S WORK. OUR HANDS.

This year marks the 10th anniversary of the tradition of the ELCA participating in a nationwide Work Day. Over the years CLF has had many projects that we have done together as a sign of our commitment to many of the ministries that are important to us and to come together as the Body of Christ!

This year our work projects will take place at Outlaw Ranch. Matt Rusch and Shannon & Jean Pulscher will come up with some projects around the camp that we can help with. Then we will also have table projects set up in one of the rooms. These projects will include making care packages or writing cards for our college students, military personnel, friends in care centers or nursing homes, etc.

On Sunday, September 10th there will NOT be worship at the church. Instead, we will gather for an abbreviated worship service in the Pavilion at Outlaw ranch at 9:40 AM. At 10 AM we will get our "work" assignments and work until noon. We will then gather for lunch under the pavilion at noon. At 12:30 those who are willing will return to the work projects until 3:30 PM. At that time, we will wrap up the fun Sunday with ice cream Sundaes and a closing prayer service.

Some of you may have the gold t-shirts from years past, but many of us do not. If you would like a t-shirt that says "God's Work. Our Hands." on the front and Custer Lutheran Fellowship on the back, there will be a sign-up sheet in the Narthex. The shirts will cost \$20 each and for us to have them by September 10th, they need to be ordered by August 15th.

PASTOR'S PONDERINGS

Have you ever wondered why or how the specific Bible passages are chosen for the bulletin each week for Sunday worship? Admittedly, it wasn't until I went to seminary that I realized the Pastor didn't just chose the Bible readings. Since the early 1990's the ELCA has been using a 3-year rotation of selected passages which typically include a reading Old Testament (Hebrew Bible), a Psalm, a reading from one of the Letters (Epistles) and a reading from one of the Gospels. Since there are four Gospel Books, the cycle was



Matthew, Mark, and Luke with some of John sprinkled into each year. This collection of suggested readings in this cycle is called the Revised Common Lectionary (RCL). Pastors then choose one of the readings, typically the Gospel Reading (Matthew, Mark, Luke or John), as the basis of the Sermon for the day.

There is another Lectionary (selection of Bible readings) that was created by a team of professors and pastors at Luther Seminary in 2010 that began as somewhat of an experiment. Within a few years it became a new option for congregations to use with many resources available including music, prayers, liturgies, etc. This is called the Narrative Lectionary. It is a four-year cycle that begins each September with readings from Genesis and each of the four years focuses on only one Gospel. For each service there will typically be only one Bible reading, but never more than two. The fall is all from Books from the Old Testament, then at Christmas we begin to add some of the Gospel, so we get the Christmas story. Between Christmas and Easter, we get the rest of the Story of Jesus according to one of the Gospels. After Easter, we turn to the Book of Acts until Pentecost. After that, we move onto the Letters that will take us through the summer. With this Lectionary, we get a more complete look at the whole Bible.

Beginning on September 10th I will start using the Narrative Lectionary. I'm excited for the new preaching challenge, as I honestly have not done a lot of preaching from the Old Testament! Beginning in September, the readings will be included in the Crossroads Newsletter. I would be thrilled to know that you would be reading through the Bible with me prior to Each Sunday. My plan is to host some adult forums on Sundays to discuss the readings together!

This is not a big change, but for those of you familiar with the RCL it will be a change. As we know, growth comes from change? I'm excited to try something new! This will not affect the church calendar, so all of the Liturgical colors and practices will remain the same. If you are interested in learning more about this change, please don't hesitate to ask—I may not know the answer because this will be new for me, too, but I will do my best to find an answer.

PARISH NURSE UPDATE

Prostate Cancer FAQs as read on Mayo Clinic website from Urologist Mitchell Humphreys, MD.

How do you know how fast my cancer is growing?

If you have low to intermediate risk for prostate cancer, there are genomic tests that can

better inform on the risk of developing a more aggressive cancer. This test looks at the DNA of your cancer cells to come up with your risk profile. None is 100%.

Is prostate cancer sexually transmitted?

No, the cancer is internal and will not spread through contact.

Is prostate cancer hereditary?

Some prostate cancers are hereditary. If you have prostate cancer, all of your first-degree relatives- parent, child or sibling- are at an elevated risk of developing prostate cancer. If you are diagnosed in your 40's and develop prostate cancer, you may want to consider a genetic consultation to see if there are known genetic risk factors that you and your family may have.

What can I do to prevent or slow prostate cancer?

There is no one thing. A healthy lifestyle including 30 minutes of exercise daily along with a diet limiting red meat and eating fresh fruits and vegetables, low in sugar and carbohydrates. A "Heart Healthy" diet has been shown to also be healthy for the prostate.

Is there a risk of cancer spreading if I have a biopsy?

No, prostate cancer will not spread that way.

When should I stop screening for prostate cancer?

Not all prostate cancer is lethal and not all prostate cancer requires treatment. As a general rule of thumb, if your life expectancy is 10 years or less, you probably will not have to worry about it affecting you in your lifetime. However, you should discuss this with your health care provider.

MENTAL HEALTH UPDATE

988 at one—1 year after the start-up of 988 as the Suicide and Crisis Helpline, follow-up has been done on the progress. Following years of advocacy and law making, 988 was made available July 2022. Since it began, contacts made to the Suicide & Crisis Helpline (988) soared by 40% and there was a huge leap in the number of contacts by texts. There was Federal funding set aside to support 988 and most states assist with funding. Since then Congress has increased funding to support the rollout and to fund crisis support services. When asked, only 1 in 5 adults knew what 988 was for. Once informed, most adults support fully funding our mental health crisis response system. In fact most also support funding mental health care overall. What more can we do to help? Support and advocate for more mental health care.

From the Bishop's Desk

Dear South Dakota Synod,

Grace and peace to you in the name of the Father and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

THANK YOU for sending your rostered leaders and voting members to the 2023 synod assembly. Almost 400 people gathered under the theme of "Cultivate" with a focus on rural ministry. Our two keynote speakers, Rev. Mark Yackel-Juleen from Wartburg Seminary and Rev. Jon Anderson from Luther Seminary, shared hard facts and data as well as hope and future vision. Did you know that Region 3, Minnesota, North Dakota and South Dakota, are the largest region in the ELCA? Did you know that 75% of the members of the ELCA live in rural communities? And did you know that the average worship attendance across the ELCA is 50-75 people?

When I travel and visit congregations across our synod, I either hear directly or in between the lines that ministry can feel lonesome as a rostered leader as well as a congregation. I hope you heard at the synod assembly that you are not alone, but that you have partners that care and are standing by to accompany you. Rev. Phil Hirsch was our churchwide representative at the Synod Assembly. While I give thanks for his report, what I want to share with you, that you do not know, is that you have left an impression on him. Once the synod assembly concluded on Saturday, he took off with our Rural Ministry Liaison, Pastor Alan Blankenfeld, and Kathy McHenry from Lutheran Planned Generosity to experience rural South Dakota. I know that he enjoyed his experience, both at the assembly as well as the tutoring from the synod, because he said so. It has sharpened his understanding of rural ministry and our place in the life and ministry of the ELCA. Thank you, South Dakota Synod, for The hospitality, your welcome, and for your ministry.

I pray for adequate moisture, farm and ranch safety, energy as you plan for fall ministry, and fun and growth during your summer ministry programming. 

Treasurer's and Finance Committee's Report: The offerings thru June were 84%

(-\$3,846) of budget but YTD remains above budget by \$10,504 (107%) and expenses were 98% of budget.

Joy discussed projected finances for the remainder of 2023 and for 2024.

Motion by Blaine, seconded by Helena to increase the Youth & Family Coordinator position to a 36 hour contract position thru January, 2024. Motion passed.

- ▲ Simplify Coffee Hosts & Fellowship discussed the difficulty sometimes of having people sign up for coffee hosts. Decision was made that if no one signs up to bring treats then there would only be coffee served.
- → Other
 - ♦ **Hardwiring wi-fi to Sanctuary –** Pastor Shannon will get estimate of cost from Marcus at Vector. Hardwiring will make wi-fi more stable.
 - ♦ Handicapped Spots there have been requests for more handicapped parking spots. Will add two more by the door on the west side of the church.

Reflections on Mission and Ministry:


Committee & Ministry Team Reports:

Thursday, Aug. 3: Psalm 145:8-9, 14-21; Proverbs 10:1-5; Philippians 4:10-15
