Worship Survey Update

Thank you all so much for participating in the worship survey! So far, 73 people filled out the survey online, 29 people filled out the paper survey, and quite a few people attended the forums. We also had 43 people make additional comments at the end of the survey, which I appreciate very much. That's amazing! Typically when surveys are introduced, only a small percentage of people complete them, so you are all awesome!



It also tells me that worship is very important to you. Worship is where we connect with God and with each other as brothers and sisters in Christ. It is where we encounter the Holy Spirit through music and the Word. It is where we celebrate and support one another in our faith and life journeys.

The Worship Survey Team has been working and praying together to help discern where the Holy Spirit is leading our worship life here at CLF. I wanted to share some of what we learned in our discussions. We looked at the Pro's and Con's of two services vs. one service:

As you can see, there are benefits and drawbacks to both choices. There truly is no clear, obvious choice for one option or the other. And as I said in my article last month, it is also not about our personal preferences or what we personally want. It's all about what is best for our congregation as a whole, as well as what is best for the people in the community who are not here in our congregation yet.

How can we best serve God? How can we best praise and celebrate God's work in and through all of us? How can we best be inviting and attractive to people in the community who are searching for a church home? And most importantly, what does the Holy Spirit want us to do and be? Those are the questions we are struggling with and praying about.

Of course all of your responses are being taken into account as well. I do care deeply about each of you and welcome all of your comments and insights. I will keep you all updated on what the Worship Survey Team discusses. There is no set deadline for making any decisions because you can't put a deadline on the Spirit. But I will certainly keep you all informed of what the team recommends to the church council.

Strokes, or a "Cerebral Event" are rather common, not only in the elderly, but in the younger generations as well. The consequences can be devastating. COUNCIL MINUTES - NOVEMBER 19, 2019

SD Synod Council Representative—Bonnie Lange represented Bishop Hagmaier and the SD Synod to say thank you for the support of CLF. Of the 23 congregations of the generous Bear Butte Conference, CLF was third in Undesignated Mission Support. (and ranked 15th in the SD Synod.) \$24,090.00 was given in 2018.

Endowment Committee—Dave Thom discussed the current year's proposals for expenditure of the 2018 interest. This endowment is dedicated to youth activities. After dispersement, should there be residual amounts of money, they will be transferred to the Restricted Funds Account for Council-directed distributions. Another endowment fund is being developed to use for other congregational needs. Currently, there is about \$5,500 in this account with \$25,000 being the minimum for opening another fund.

Treasurer's and Finance Committee Report—The council reviewed the treasurer's report submitted by Joy. The 2019 contributions YTD are at 94.8% of the budgeted amount. The updated strategic plan is successfully cutting expenditures to balance the projected shortfall in revenue. Council supported a recommendation by the treasurer to reformat the budget report to differentiate restricted and unrestricted income and expenses. The council considered and took action on the following Finance Committee recommendations:

- It was moved and seconded that Benefits/Compensation Guidelines for Lay Staff be altered to read: "4. Paid Holidays. Seven paid holidays will be paid based on the average number of scheduled hours per fiveday workweek." The council approved this measure. (M/S/A)
- + The Council supported the Finance Committee recommendation that CLF consider developing Guidelines for Personal Gifts, to ensure reasonable and equitable limits and transparency when giving personal gifts purchased with church funds to individuals to mark occasions or express gratitude.
- Two years ago the council began setting aside \$700 per month for future Capital Improvements. There is currently \$21,164 in the restricted capital improvement fund. The Council endorsed the recommendation to continue setting aside a monthly amount to maintain and build those restricted reserves so the cost of big ticket capital items or repairs can be spread evenly over multiple budget years.
- + The council supported a target carrying amount of \$50,000 for capital improvement Fund and \$20,000 for Furniture, Fixtures and Equipment Fund. Council will include withdrawals of restricted funds for known building needs in the annual budget and could approve emergency withdrawals for unanticipated building expenses. Council will budget non-restricted funds for routine maintenance and repairs, and equipment.

+ Council approved moving Capital Improvement and Memorial Accounts to Black Hills Federal Credit Union.

Unfinished Business:

- + **Thrivent Choice**—Received in November —\$24; received \$1,965 year-to-date.
- + Nominating Committee Update—three people have been recruited to serve on the CLF church council.
- + Financial Review Committee Update—Allen Canete, Donna McConnell and Teresa Obenauer have agreed to provide this service.
- + **Stewardship**—Pledge cards are being collected and council members volunteered to call members to collect information for budgeting purposes by early December.
- Building Updates Paul Horsted and Dave Thom have agreed to chair the Properties Committee. Paul and Dave Pickford removed the sheet rock and foam insulation from the utility room in the basement and determined the probable cause of the leak into the basement. The mold in the basement has been removed. The completion of the acoustic tile in the Down Under will be completed soon.
- Review of Active Shooter/Safety Training— It was well-conducted. It was noted that the "escape" door on the south side of the sanctuary does not have a pressure lock mechanism, making it difficult to open in a panic situation. Gene volunteered to seek a possible solution.

New Business:

- + Annual Meeting —Set for Jan. 26, 2020. Budget forum Jan. 12th at 9:30, Annual Reports due Jan 10th.
- Endowment Recommendations—The council voted to approve the Endowment Committee's recommendation to disperse funds as follows: 1) \$600 to CHS Student Council to rent the Custer Beacon for 5th Quarters for three events this school year. 2) \$1000 to Custer County Library to help with teen book club, pre-school story hour, and summer reading program. 3) \$1200 to fund ten YMCA Youth Scholarships. 4) \$1300 to Lifeways. 5) \$500 to RAP group for expenses associated with youth activities.
- + Reducing Paper and Plastic Use in the kitchen—a reminder to use Corelle ware dishes and cups will be placed in the kitchen area.


