REFLECTIONS FROM PASTOR PAM!



Do you like surprises? Good ones, like surprise birthday parties, or a surprise visit from someone you haven't seen in a long time? Many of us do. We love to be surprised because it shows us how much someone loves and cares for us – enough to plan a special party or visit.



But how about those unwelcome surprises? Sudden illness, car breaking down, job loss? We don't love those surprises as much! I was on the receiving end of one of those unexpected surprises recently at the church! I got up on a Satur-

day morning to get ready for a memorial service that day, only to discover we had no water at the parsonage. So I quickly ran over to the church to see if there was water there. Nope!

It must have been pretty comical, but I'm thankful no one was there right then to see the look of shock and confusion on my face! I wandered around the church for a few minutes, trying to see if there was something obviously wrong that would cause us to not have water. I was also frantically thinking of who to call since Augie was on vacation.

Thankfully, quite a few people came to the rescue, showing up and calling lots of people for help. It turned out that lightning struck our well the night before when we were having a horrible thunder and lightning storm. I am so thankful for everyone who jumped in to help and kept calm in the midst of a mess! Especially the family who were expecting a nice lunch after their loved one's memorial service!

It's easy to panic and get angry and spiral into thoughts of "Why me" or "Why is God doing this or allowing this to happen?" I admit that I had thoughts of "Why couldn't this have happened on a Monday when there's nothing going on???" But then it turned into thankfulness to God for sending all these wonderful people to help, and

for the patience and understanding of everyone that Saturday – from the family, to the women helping in the kitchen, to the VFW who allowed us to move the lunch there at a moment's notice, to all of you who understood when I canceled worship that Sunday.

God is good all the time! All the time God is good! We have been talking for several weeks now about recognizing how the Holy Spirit is working in and through us and the people around us. That lightning strike, even though it happened at a terribly inconvenient time, showed all of us how much the Holy Spirit is involved in everything, all the time. The Spirit put the right people in the right place at the right time, and kept our hearts open to different possibilities in that moment. Even though it was frustrating, God showed up.

The next time life throws an unexpected surprise your way, try to find God in the midst of it. Look for where the Spirit is showing up – in you, in the people around you, in the situation itself. Even when bad surprises come – maybe especially in those times – God is there. The Spirit shows up. Jesus' love surrounds you. Our call is to open our eyes and look for it. And when we are in the midst of it, we may not see the Spirit at work, but someone else will. You can be that someone.

Keep your eyes and hearts open to the Spirit, and point it out wherever you see God at work. The more you look, the more you'll find, and the more you'll be able to shout, "Thanks be to God!"

OUR NEW BISHOP



The Rev. Constanze Hagmaier was elected June 1 during the SD Synod Assembly to serve a six-year term as bishop of the South Dakota Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA).

Bishop-Elect Constanze Hagmaier is married to The Rev. Dirk Hagmaier and they have two biological children: Paul, 20; Emma, 4; and one foster son, Lymann, 21. The Bishop-Elect Hagmaier and The Rev. Dirk have most recently been serving as the pastors at Trinity Lutheran Church in Madison, SD. Bishop-Elect Hagmaier's previous positions are as follows:

- → Co-pastor Waubay Lutheran Parish, Waubay, SD
- → Interim Co-pastor Holy Cross Lutheran Church, Aberdeen, SD.
- → Co-pastor Florence Lutheran Parish, Florence, SD
- → Pastor Salem Lutheran Church, Parkston, SD

Bishop-Elect Hagmaier's first experience of South Dakota was in 1987 as a Rotary exchange student, where she lived in Sioux Falls and attended Brandon Valley High School as a Junior and worshiped at Brandon Lutheran. Upon her return to Germany, she continued her education at the Ruprecht Karl's University in Heidelberg, Germany, where she graduated with her Master of Divinity degree in 1999. Upon the family's immigration to the U.S. in September 1999, both the Rev. Dirk and Bishop-Elect Hagmaier affiliated with Luther Seminary, Saint Paul, Minnesota. The couple was ordained while serving the Waubay Lutheran Parish at NeSoDak Bible Camp on February 10, 2001.

Bishop-Elect Hagmaier will succeed Bishop David Zellmer and take office on September 1, 2019, as bishop of the South Dakota Synod, ELCA, following a month of overlap in August. Please keep the South Dakota Synod in your prayers as we enter into this time of transition. Bishop-Elect Hagmaier said that she is grateful for the outpouring of support, well wishes and prayers as the family transitions into this new phase of their life. She is looking forward to meeting the people of the Synod in their respective ministry settings, conference and Synodical events.

THE CARING HANDS MINISTRY

LUTHERANS OUTDOORS IN SOUTH DAKOTA

SUMMARY OF LETTER FROM EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Thank you for your congregation's continual support of the ministry of Lutherans Outdoors in South Dakota (LOSD). Lutherans Outdoors held its Annual Meeting on May 31, 2019, during the yearly Assembly of the SD Synod of the ELCA. It is a time of celebrating what is happening lately at the camps, honoring Board members and staff, and giving general updates of the ministry.

Christina Nath, LO Board Chairperson, shared:

- LO performed a nationwide search for a new Executive Director during the past year. I began my service in this role on January 1, 2019. I am honored and blessed to be chosen.
- LO chose to make NeSoDak Bible Camp a seasonal ministry and closed down the site from late November to April 1.
- Because of the change of NeSoDak to seasonal, LO chose to have one director oversee both NeSoDak and Joy Ranch. That director is Jake Hanson, who was the director at NeSoDak.
- The property known as Atlantic Mountain Ranch is currently listed for sale with a realtor in the Black Hills area.

I shared:

- During the past four years, LO has accumulated an operating debt of over \$800,000. A current bank line of credit in the amount of \$750,000 will be paid off this summer using Board Designated Endowment funds.
 The current LO budget in place has been decreased by 10%, or \$300,000.
- There have been 20 staff position changes of the year-round and full-time staff during the past three years.
- Summer staff hiring was very difficult this season and NeSoDak Bible Camp was unable to hire about 10 counseling positions. This led to the difficult decision to cancel all NeSoDak Day Camp programs for this summer. Of the 50 counselor positions LO did hire, only 20 of them are from South Dakota Synod ELCA congregations. I say this is alarming.
- Even though there has been some financial challenges and the current summer staffing vacancies, please know that the staff of Lutherans Outdoors continue to provide an excellent Christ-centered, faith-growing experience in God's beautiful outdoors for all that attend.

Our thanks to the many congregations that believe in this ministry and continue to support it.

PARISH NURSE NEWS

What does a Parish Nurse do?

As Parish Nurse for CLF, I look at helping others in a "holistic" manner. What that means is I care for the body, mind and soul. How do I do this?

I look after the **health of our congregation**. I help in any way I can for those dealing with illness or surgery. I monitor blood pressures once a month for anyone. I also try to monitor those with chronic illnesses.

I look after those dealing with loss. I am here for anyone who would like someone to talk with and **help guide them through grief**. A person's loss can also mean in other ways: loss of identity, pet, job, independence.

I look after those with **Mental Health issues**. I am here to work with the person who may be struggling, and with family or friends. Everything I do is confidential. I try to educate people to better understand and help with coping.

I look after those who are still very much a part of our congregation, but for various reasons are unable to attend services. I bring them communion the first Sunday of the month. I also **spend time visiting** with them to keep informed on their health and well-being and just being company for them. Some can be feeling very isolated or having difficulty transitioning to a Nursing Home. I currently visit at least eight people and love this part of my service to our congregation. I also try to visit others living most often in Rapid City, to also bring our congregation to them.

I also **try my best to educate**. I work with our Health Ministry Team in their efforts, as well as when I may stop and talk with people who I know are going through difficulties. And last but not least, I write these articles every month to bring current news on health issues and Mental Health. **Keep reading!**

This past week I have read several very interesting articles relating to the greater need for mental health care. Many have been talking about this for a long time, but guess what...not much seems to be happening. In the meantime, people are dying, families suffer and our communities are being affected. I did see one positive message. The number of people calling into our 211 system for mental health needs is increasing. Does this necessarily mean the numbers of mental health issues are increasing? In some respects I can see this, especially with our rural farming communities and the increased uncertainty of farm income. I like to think the reason is because more people are starting up discussions and feel a bit more secure in asking for help. Sometimes, these calls are pivotal moments, letting someone know they need help. **Do you know someone out there?** Let them know there is help.

Council Minutes - May 28, 2019
