Pentecost this year is on Sunday, June 9th, which seems strange to me. Usually it falls sometime in May, so having it in June seems odd. But Pentecost moves around based on the date of Easter, so it's no wonder it's later this year since Easter was later.

So what's the big deal about Pentecost? If I asked you what te it, what would you say? The simple answer is that Pentecost is the d

Pentecost means and why we celebrate it, what would you say? The simple answer is that Pentecost is the day we celebrate the giving of the Holy Spirit to the church. It always happens 50 days after Easter.

The bigger answer is that Pentecost is not just one, single day. It is not something that happened once way back in the early church and it's over and done with. It's not something that happened to a handful of people, but continues to happen all over the world to all kinds of different people. And that includes each of us!

As Lutherans, we celebrate the giving of the Holy Spirit to us at our baptism. But like the early church, this isn't a one-time event that we can then forget about. We celebrate the Holy Spirit's ongoing presence in our lives and in the life of our faith community every day. Or we should!

Recently in worship I asked if anyone could give an example of a time when they experienced the Holy Spirit working in their lives. And most people had a difficult time coming up with a concrete example. It's not because the Spirit isn't working; it's because we don't always look for it, or recognize it when we see it.

The Spirit works and shows up in so many different ways. Part of the struggle is to open our eyes and become aware of it. Often for me, the Spirit works by putting certain people in my life when I need them. Or maybe I am put into someone else's life when they need me. Often we attribute different events to coincidence, but I don't believe in coincidence. I think it's often the Holy Spirit at work.

I invite you during this month to actively look for how the Holy Spirit is working in you, in our faith community, and in the world. And you never know, I may ask in worship again where you've seen the Spirit at work!

And don't forget to wear Holy Spirt Red on June 9th as we celebrate this amazing gift! Blessings,

PARISH NURSE NEWS

I hope you have been enjoying some of these nice days. The Health Ministry Team spent a few hours cleaning up the Labyrinth area, behind the Parsonage, next to the Outdoor Worship area. If you have never walked it, try it sometime. There is information in a covered stand out there. I see that Pastor Pam will be starting a Walking Worship and will be including the Labyrinth.

With summer comes more injuries, especially to children. Moms, Dads & Grandparents, make sure the kids are involved in the outdoors. Have them take a long break from "screen time" and get outside. Take walks, ride their bicycles and play outdoor games. Not only is it good for them to take a break from the TV, video game or phone, the exercise is great and they will learn to appreciate nature. I see that the city has been working on replacing some of the older equipment in the parks. Be prepared for more cuts, bruises and insect bites. Have a first aid kit stocked with a wound cleanser, antibiotic ointment, band aids, gauze pads and tape. If you are unsure an injury should be seen by a Doctor, most often it is better to err on the side of caution. If you suspect a broken bone, most certainly they should be seen. If they have a broken bone that has pierced through the skin, they have a very serious fracture & should be taken to an ER. Any wound that will not stop bleeding after applying pressure with a clean cloth for 15 minutes, should be taken in. If they are bitten by a dog, take them in and find out which dog has bitten them, so the dog can be quarantined and tested for rabies. Even an insect bite that swells up and is reddened and warm, should be watched closely. If the swelling continues, or they become ill from it, take them in. **Make the outdoors a family affair, as adults will benefit from it as well!**

MENTAL HEALTH NEWS

I recently heard about an **amazing new medication to treat Depression**. What is so great, is that they have found that the response to treatment with the medication is fast acting, with a good response within days! As a person who has suffered with Depression for many years, I know the frustration of first going through a number of medications to find one that you respond to. During that time, it takes weeks to even know if it will help, before starting all over with a new one. All this time, the Depression is hanging over you, which can have very serious consequences. Another thing with medications are all the side effects they can cause. With this new med, the side effects are also less than the older medications. At this time, I'm not sure how well it's covered by insurance, but often there are also coupons to reduce cost from the manufacturer. If you are someone who is resistive to typical treatments, talk to your Doctor about trying this new treatment. Of course, along with medication, individual or group therapies are helpful. This can be a total game changer!
