"Then I hard the voice of the Lord saying, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" And I said, "Here am I; send me!" Isaiah 6:8

We have all read or heard this verse from the prophet Isaiah, and have sung the song, "Here I am, Lord." You will have just heard it again in worship on May $30^{\text {th }}$, which is Holy Trinity Sunday.


The larger passage has more of this call to Isaiah by God, and more of Isaiah's initial response. Isaiah was experiencing both awe and fear in this vision of God in the temple. He exclaims, "Woe is me! I am lost, for I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips; yet my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts!" (Isaiah 6:5). Isaiah is having a vision where he has seen God, and proclaims that he is not worthy to see the Lord. He is unclean, a sinner, and so is everyone around him. He is definitely not worthy to be in the presence of God.
Yet, God is there. God comes to Isaiah, this unclean, unworthy man. And God calls Isaiah to go out and proclaim God's will to the people. And Isaiah immediately says, "Here am I; send me!" Not knowing what that meant, of course.


God calls each of us, maybe not in the same, dramatic way. But you and I have been called just the same. Each of us has been claimed by God and called to ministry in His name. Sounds crazy, right? You may be thinking, "Who am I? I'm not good enough, smart enough, strong enough to have God call me to do anything!" But God knows who you are - knows everything about you. After all, God is the one who created you! I recently shared this on Facebook: "How cool is it that the same God who created the mountains oceans, and galaxies, looked at you and thought the world needed one of you, too," Do we ever think of that? Probably not. But I think we need to be reminded regularly that God created you for a reason. God created you with all of your uniqueness - all your quirks and flaws and everything - because God knew the world needed you.
God gave you unique gifts and talents - things that you are good at, things you are passionate about - and calls you to use those gifts in His name. So how will you answer God's call? In what ways will you use your gifts to spread God's love and welcome?
Celebrate who you are - God's beloved child, created by God, given your own unique gifts. Remember that God calls and claims you just as you are. And celebrate your uniqueness by answering God's call to share your gifts and passions.
How will you answer God's call today?

Dear South Dakota Synod,
Grace and peace to you in the name of the triune God. - I hope these words find you soaking up the warmth of summer. While last year we postponed family and class reunions and avoided gatherings altogether die to the pandemic, I hope you are back to do what you enjoy, being together in community.
While you read these lines, I will be visiting with my family in Germany. I have not seen my parents or my son, who works and lives there, in two years. My Mom was diagnosed with dementia a few years ago, and my dad and our son are the sole caretakers. I will use my time to check in with the doctors, see how my family is holding up and enjoy my afternoon pastries while visiting those I love.
I give thanks for regaining the freedom to travel again. Are there restrictions? Absolutely! But because vaccinations in the US moved along fast we are able to enjoy traveling much safer again. Did you get your vaccine yet? I did. But I have to admit I am among those who reluctantly went to be vaccinated. Yes, I had fears, I had questions, I wanted to wait, but faithful conversations with medical personnel and scientists assured me that I will be okay. Did it take care of all of my reluctance? Honestly, no, it hasn't, but I trust that those who work with and on vaccines know and answer truthfully. And has a person of faith I trust that in the midst of science and my fears God holds me and cares for my doubts and all. If you have fears about the vaccine talk to your doctor or medical provider you trust to help you ease your fears, and maybe with more conversations you one day will also be ready to reluctantly get vaccinated. But no matter what, Know that regardless you are a beloved child of God.

## Psalm 104.24b: "The earth is full..."

I will never forget the first time I laid eyes on a blooming flax field. I was around 7 years old, and sitting on the passenger side of my grandfather's pickup as we were driving to our family farm. It was a very windy North Dakota day, and as I looked out the passenger window to my right, I thought my eyes were playing tricks on me. I knew it was just a ditch, and immediately a field, and then a row of trees, but all could see was water.
As a North Dakota girl at the ripe old age of seven, I had never stood at the water's edge and looked upon a wavy sea, but I saw the sea that in the bluish, purple flowers of a field of blooming flax. The wind made waves in the field, reminding me of Genesis, when God's Spirit (God's breath!) moved over the primordial waters. I have never forgotten the image of when I saw the sea on the prairie.
When I think of the earth being full, I think of the wind moving over that blooming flax field, creating such beauty that it still has the power to take my breath away. "The earth is full..." the psalmist sings.
In Psalm 104, what is known as a 'creation psalm,' the psalmist writes poetry and lyrics to be sung about God's good creation: The earth is full of creatures, the seas, vast and spacious, full of living things. Springs of water and mountains and the animals of the field. Birds that sing among the branches and grass that grows for the cattle. Plants for human beings to cultivate and food from the earth to make the good things of life: wine, oil, and bread.
"I will sing to the Lord as long as I live; I will sing praise to my God while I have being (Psalm 104.33)," sings the psalmist.
We can easily get overwhelmed with what the earth can seem to be full of: violence, war, genocide, refugees, fear, poverty, hunger, disease, politics, pollution, and greed. Yes, these are some of the realities of the world we live in, and yet, the psalmist calls our attention to what else the earth is also full of: great beauty, creatures, provisions, and life!
As you wake and as you lie down, may a song of praise be on your lips and in your heart.
