

LENTEN SEASON OFFERINGS - YOUR MOUNTAIN OF GIVING!

The Social Ministry Team reports that our Lenten Season "Build the Mountain" Offering was quite successful. During five weeks of Lent, our Fellowship family brought to the altar various and sundry items needed by non-profits who are conducting God's Work in our community.

- A van load of toilet paper, paper towels, canned goods and personal hygiene items was collected and delivered to the W.E.A.V.E. facility. In addition, \$365 in cash offerings were collected.
- 305 lbs. of food was collected for **The Storehouse**. In addition, \$345 in cash offerings were collected.
- Approximately 4,125 diapers, 4 packages of baby wipes, and 10 baby quilts from the quilters were donated for the **Pine Ridge Diaper Drive**. In addition, \$320 in cash offerings were collected.
- Over 300 lbs. of dog food and 75 lbs. of cat food and approximately 50 lbs. of needed towels and blankets were collected for the **Battle Mountain Humane Society.** In addition, \$515 in cash offerings were collected.




• Over 100 small gift offerings (for Veteran family gift bags) were collected for **Operation Black Hills Cabin.** In addition, \$266 in cash offerings were collected.

REFLECTIONS FROM PASTOR PAM!

Church Council has begun reading the book "Discovering Hope: Building Vitality in Rural Congregations" (by David Poling-Goldenne and L. Shannon Jung) as our devotions each month at the beginning of our meetings. It's a book that I was given by the synod as part of the Hope in the Heartlands conference Laura Burden and I attended in February.



PRAYER

It's been an interesting book to read so far. It talks about the focus that vital and thriving congregations have in their lives and ministry that sets them apart from congregations who are struggling. In April, we read the chapter about prayer and how vital congregations spend time and energy in prayer, both individually and as a congregation.

One of the sentences that struck me is this: These congregations "read Scripture with the expectation that God will speak to them. Their prayers and devotions are quite particular and pointed – they expect to hear God addressing them." All of these vital congregations talk about Jesus and see God acting in and through their ministry. They know that God is actively guiding and leading them, and the church.

It made me question whether we all do that. Do we read scripture expecting God to speak to us through the Bible? When we pray, do we expect to have a real encounter with God, or are we simply talking "at" without really expecting God to respond? Do we know that God leads and guides us, and then follow where God leads?

I think many of us do. CLF has many people who are very aware of God's presence and guidance in their lives. They do have a strong relationship with Jesus and knows God hears them when they pray.

But I think we can always strengthen our prayer lives, and strengthen our ability to see the Holy Spirit working in and through us and the congregation. I'm going to be working on putting together a class on prayer that will be offered this Summer. We will look at different forms of prayer, have different people share their experience with prayer, and include visiting our prayer labyrinth next to our outdoor worship space.

I am also thinking of ways to introduce a time in worship to share our experiences of the Holy Spirit and God in our lives so we get used to talking about it, and learn to see God working in and around us more often.

Keep an eye out for the prayer class in the next month or two, and I invite you to be open to new experiences in worship, too, as we continue to learn and grow in our prayer life together.

PARISH NURSE NEWS

STRESS

Stress is a normal physical reaction to danger and the demands of life. In a small amount, it is healthy, motivating you to perform well. Stress becomes unhealthy when it pushes you beyond your ability to cope. Unchecked, it can damage your health, relationships or quality of life. Here are some tips for managing your stress:

- 1. **Create awareness.** Listen to your body. Do you clench your teeth? Is your heart beating faster? Are your muscles tense? Are thoughts racing through your head? Write down your thoughts and symptoms, by checking your body for the above symptoms. Reflect on the stressor (cause) for stress. Is it a real threat or an irrational thought?
- 2. **Focus your attention on the present moment**. This will take practice. Try focusing on the details of your everyday surroundings and experience. Try taking a walk and noticing your surroundings in detail. Once home, reflect on your walk and how it made you feel.
- 3. Look for opportunities to practice focusing on the details in your life. How was your dinner, how did it taste? How you are breathing? Focus on breathing in slowly and deeply through your nose, and exhale just as slowly through your lips. Try to do this until you feel calm and relaxed.
- 4. **Don't pass judgement on yourself** for at least three minutes. We often have a reflex response when judging.
- 5. Create a space for gratitude.

MENTAL HEALTH NEWS

The connection between "Bipolar Disease" and alcohol and/or drug addiction becomes a two-fold problem. Inherited traits can be associated with both. Bipolar disease typically makes a person have periods of extreme lows, "Depression", along with periods of "Mania", where the person has lowered inhibitions and less control over their behaviors. During periods of depression & anxiety, people may turn to drugs or alcohol to feel "better", but in the long run, it will make their symptoms worse. During episodes of "mania", there is less control over inhibition which easily leads to increased alcohol and drug abuse. Treatment will be focused on the "Dual Diagnosis", Bipolar accompanied by alcohol or drug dependence. This will often require specialized professionals. Seeking treatment as soon as possible will make it easier to treat.



COUNCIL MINUTES - APRIL 23, 2019

Treasurer's and Finance Committee Report—Joy reviewed the current statement of financial position and the offering/attendance trends. The council supported the recommendation of the finance committee to suspend all discretionary spending until income increases. There are some sources of non-restricted cash equivalents available. Unfinished Business:

- + Thrivent Choice—Received in April—\$206; received \$1,857 year to date
- ★ Water Damage Update—Due to unforeseen circumstances, Gene was not available to report. Dave Pickford will contact Paul Larson of the property committee to determine how and when the sheet rock will be removed in the fellowship hall to prevent further damage.
- **→ Safety and Security**—Pastor Pam will contact Matt Tramp, security officer, to set up an in-service for ushers, council members, staff, etc., to learn how to plan for the safety of the church attendees.

New Business:

- **→ Membership Changes**—Transfer Out: Amy and Daniel Scherer; Charlie and Mary Myers.
- + Fax Machine Status— Since it has been determined that a fax machine is not needed, Brad moved, it was seconded, and the council approved the discontinuation of the 3rd phone line and the fax machine. (M/S/A)
- **Campfire Worship**—The Wednesday night outdoor worship services will start May 22 and run through August 28, 2019, at 6:30 PM. To ensure the fire is going well, council members and others that volunteer will start the fire at 6:00 PM.

Reflections on Mission and Ministry—Pastor Pam reported a successful Easter week and that she is working to transform the Transformational Ministry Team. She is open to accepting some new group members. She also reported that she has been working with the SD Community Organizing group, consulting with the bishop's office, and building a network of people throughout the state.
