ACTIVE SHOOTER/SAFETY TRAINING

Deputy Matt Tramp will be holding an active shooter and safety training here at CLF on <u>Saturday</u>, <u>November 16th from 8:00 am – 12:00 pm</u>. He will be training us using the **ALICE** system – Alert, Lock Down, Inform, Counter, Evacuate. It is so important to be prepared in the highly unlikely event that something would happen here, especially in worship. This is not only for leaders or ushers in the church, but for *everyone in the congregation*.

ALICE is an options-based active threat response system designed for the unarmed civilian. ALICE deviates from the traditional responses in empowering the individual to make the best choice for their survival in a constantly evolving, dynamic, and intense incident. There are no secrets in ALICE. It is merely taking common-sense survival instincts and putting them into an easily referenced system that can then be applied to each persons' specific setting and set of circumstances. Worship Survey - Why are we doing this?

I have heard from various people wondering why we are doing this worship survey, and why are we doing it now? Since I have been at CLF – almost two years now! – I have heard various comments about worship, questioning why we have two services during the school year and one in the summer. Of course there are a lot of opinions about what we "should" be doing!



I decided it was time to really look at our worship life together, why we do what we do, and discern where the Holy Spirit is leading us. What we all need to discern together is how we can best worship together, experience God's presence in worship, have a fulfilling worship experience for our congregation, and also how to make the service inviting for those who aren't here. Clearly this is not a simple, easy, or quick thing to discern!

We have a wonderful team who have learned a lot about worship, including the pros and cons of one worship service and two worship services. We have discovered it is not as simple as one service is better than two or two services is better than one. There are benefits and drawbacks to everything!

The most important thing we talked about, though, is that what time we have worship, or how many services we have should never simply be about our preferences. Decisions should never be made based on what *I* like or what *I* want, or what is most convenient for *me*. And the same is true for you. We certainly all have our opinions and preferences in worship, whether it's the time, the amount of people in worship, the style of music, etc. But an individual's preference should never drive decisions about worship.

So what should drive decisions about worship? God. The Holy Spirit. And the purpose of worship. We spent time talking about the purpose of worship, because if we don't know why we are in worship, then how can we discern the best way to honor God in our worship? The most basic decision we are working on is how we can best praise God and feel the Spirit's presence in worship, not only for ourselves, but also for those in the community who are not here yet.

We will be offering an online survey as well as opportunities to gather together to talk about worship. There is information with those details on page 2 in this newsletter. You can see it is not simply a matter of whether we should have two services or one service. It's not about what you or I prefer or want. It's about what God wants and where the Holy Spirit leads us in our discussion and discernment.

You will continue to hear about this work, and have opportunities to share what you think and feel because that is very important. I want to know what you think and how you feel about worship. And yes, we will be asking about your preferences. Just know that this goes beyond preferences. It is ultimately about how we can best honor and praise God in worship together.


WOYATAN RETREAT CENTER

Parish Nurse News

The word is out...*get your flu shots now!* Well, my husband Dwight & I went to the clinic today to get our flu shots. It turns out that people over 65, as are my husband & I, are supposed to get a special flu shot which apparently is better, as it has a broader coverage. So what happens? There apparently is a national shortage of this flu shot, but maybe they will be available next week. Now, I'm not blaming the clinic, or those who are urging everyone to get their flu shots. Why weren't the national laboratories or Health Department prepared with these special flu shots? If this is their directive, they should have been prepared with an adequate supply by this time, as I have heard that flu season has begun. Don't give up though, as having the flu shot does a pretty good job of preventing or lessening the symptoms of the season's flu.

While you are at it, make sure you are up-to-date on the pneumonia vaccine; there are now two. There is also a vaccine for shingles, another condition you will want to avoid. It can leave you with debilitating pain issues. Remember the flu vaccine is not just for older folks, it's very important for the young and general population. This can prevent large outbreaks in schools or the workplace. You also do not want to spread the flu virus to the very susceptible.

I believe we have a big problem in our area of the state. Even though we have a high number of suicide attempts as completed suicides, we have inadequate resources for short or long-term care. Imagine somebody dear to you becomes depressed, bipolar, schizophrenic or has other mental health issues. They may be able to get short-term care. What if that person requires a longer term admission? We do not have any long-term mental health facilities nearby, or anywhere in the western part of South Dakota. This person becomes separated from their family and friends and spiritual help and healing. It is a long way to go to Yankton, that is if they even have an available bed. When facing a mental health crisis, they need that contact more than ever. We really need to advocate for additional Mental Health facilities to provide care for the entire state. We need to let our legislators and governor know how concerned we are. For more information, please contact me.
