




ALL SAINTS WORSHIP

As part of our "Faithful, Hopeful, Loving" stewardship series, I offered several different experiences during worship. I was pleasantly surprised at how many of you participated in these Prayer Stations. I hope you found them as interesting, powerful, and fun, as I did. The first week I offered a series of questions based on Isaiah 61:1-2, and I wanted to share some of the responses to those questions.

Are any of these acts controversial today, and why?

- Many people today are angry over migration and refugees
- The caring for immigrants is frowned upon because people are fearful of their own being
- Caring for the lowly is controversial to those in power or afraid

Can you feel the Spirit of the Lord anointing you?

What are you being called to do and be?

- Be less judgmental, more loving
- Be more open to listen to anyone
- Trust the promise
- Be a good example for my daughter
- Stand up for the oppressed, love my family and neighbor
- Help the lonely, the sick, and bring them the joy of the Lord

What movements of change are you paying attention to in the world?

- The deepening of personal growth and responsibility
- Those using their religion to create fear.
- Learning to love everyone and reject hate.
- The stuff going on with cyber-bullying.
- Don't take others hope.

How can you individually, and we as a church, be more attentive to the suffering in the world?

- Engage more people in praying for all God's people in crisis
- Try to understand people whose views are different from mine
- Welcome everyone, be accepting
- Continue to pray and be present in the moment
- Show grace to everyone

I see an over-arching theme of love for all people, and wanting to help everyone who is in need. That should not be surprising to any of you because CLF has been and continues to be a place full of the love of God and a passion for sharing that love in all sorts of ways. As a congregation we engage in all kinds of ministries that help people in need, including The Storehouse, WEAVE, ELCA World Hunger, Lutheran Disaster Relief, and many, many more.

Many times the Gospel is seen as controversial because Jesus calls us to care for the widow, the orphan, and all people in need, and that can be upsetting to people in power who want to keep the poor in their place. But Isaiah in this passage, and Jesus throughout his ministry, are clear about what it means to be a disciple. Part of our stewardship of our resources, including our time, the gifts we have, and our finances, is focused on who we are called to be as God's beloved children.

It is exciting to hear how we are all continuing to work on our faithfulness, recognizing that it is an ongoing process. We continue to learn and grow in our faith and response to Jesus call. Sometimes that involves struggling with our own beliefs, or how to respond to things happening in our community and the world. But it always involves the love of Jesus.

I am proud to be part of such a loving and passionate congregation! Thank you for all you do to serve our Savior and spread His love!

PARISH NURSE UPDATE BY MARY KLEIN

The Health Ministry Team has finally changed out our info board. This time we are highlighting information on the Covid-19 Pandemic. Take a look, there's a lot Parish Nurse of great information and extra information in front of it on the table for you to take.



I was fortunate to have someone special give me an article from the "Gather" magazine titled "Body, Mind and Spirit" about Parish Nursing. I truly enjoyed reading it and I want to share a little of what was said. See if you think I am living up to my title.

Parish Nursing or "Faith Community Nursing", was formalized in the 1980's by a Lutheran Pastor named Granger Westburg. He was fascinated by the intersections of faith and wellness. He formalized the education built on holistic medicine. The concept of a Parish Nurse course was a foundation of training to care for the mind, body and spirit. I took such a course in Sioux Falls, that taught me these concepts and gave me ideas on how I was going to evolve into the position. Faith Community Nurses care for the congregation and community in many ways. "FCNs" offer blood pressure screening, host workshops, offer CPR and first aid classes and maintain automatic defibrillators. They also write newsletter articles about health issues and do so much more, including home communion and visitation ministry.

We work on building trust in different ways, such as, during blood pressure screening, they often educate the person and talk about other issues as well. Sometimes just listening is enough, but often they translate medical jargon and advocate and help navigate people through complex health issues and the medical health systems.

As a Parish Nurse, I get to care for the body, mind and spirit, which is much different than a typical hospital or clinic nurse. When we visit we also pray together. When I do home or Nursing Home visits, my favorite part is saying the Lord's Prayer together.

During the pandemic, adjustments had to be made to keep the people we visit and ourselves safe. For quite some time. I was told. I couldn't make home visits and of course, there were no more Nursing Home visits. This was guite difficult for them and ourselves. Many calls and cards were done, which I know were appreciated and also afforded the opportunity to visit. In time, our duties were resumed in a safe manner. We were all very happy to once again visit, do blood pressure screenings and other typical duties.

Another focus of caring for our congregation's health is monitoring and offering education on mental health issues. This also involves Greif Support, which I know I need to be more active in.

"Everyone needs healing, be it physical, emotional or spiritual. We are all sinners, and we all need healing, whether we think so or not." During difficult times people come to a spiritual healing and it helps them accept a disability or loss.

The last paragraph says it all. "The whole emphasis of my calling was making God real in people's lives, meeting them where they were and reminding them that God is here."

FROM THE BISHOP'S DESK

Grace and peace to you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Many among us use the month of November to practice gratefulness as we prepare for Thanksgiving at the end of the month. A few years ago, long before COVID was a thing, I invited people to join me for a Facebook Live Bible study during the season of Lent. Together we journeyed through Apostle Paul's letter to the Philippians, using James Harnish's book *Easter Earthquake* as our guide. While many parts of the study have since then left my memory, what still resonates with me is that Paul wrote his letter from prison, but instead of making it about how he has become a victim of someone else's exercise of unjust power, he writes: "Now, I want you to know, ..., that what has happened to me had really served to advance the Gospel. As a result, it has become clear throughout the whole palace guard and to everyone else that I am in chains for Christ. Because of my chains, most of the brothers in the Lord have been encouraged to speak the word of God more courageously and fearlessly." (Phil 1:12-14)

When I visit congregations I hear lament over how communities of faith are no longer what they were in 2020. That is true, but let me ask you, would we be the same even if COVID had not changed how we are a community that we were in 2019? My answer is no. You know how the saying goes, the only constant is change. Life is in constant motion, and our lives change from one moment to the next, which in turn also changes how we are living in community. Usually, change happens more gradually, but COVID has propelled us forward in warp speed. It's a challenge to catch up with the pace. And it can easily feel as if we are prisoners of something that holds power over us. I take comfort from the Apostle Paul's words, who was imprisoned for his faith, but instead of taking on the victim role, he understands and uses it as an opportunity to proclaim the good news of Jesus' death and resurrection. How would our communities change, if we look at our current situations as an opportunity to proclaim God's good news?

What keeps you up at night?

"For the whole law is summed up in a single commandment, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' If, however, you bite and devour one another, take care that you are not consumed by one another." - Galatians 5.14-15

In October of 2019, the synod staff visited every conference, asking folks 3 questions:

- 1. What gives you joy?
- 2. What keeps you up at night?
- 3. What do you hope for from your synod staff?

One of the most common answers given to the question, "What keeps you up at night?" was, 'Polarization'. Keep in mind, this answer was given pre-pandemic.

In November, the first call ministers serving in the SD Synod will gather for retreat and first call education. The book we are all reading together right now and will discuss in November is: *Polarization and the Healthier Church* by Ronald W. Richardson. Here is a brief insight from Richardson about polarization and the danger of it:

It is normal for human communities to hold a range of opinions along a continuum on nearly any topic. Normally, people in groups do not all think the same. Life would be dull if that were the case. In polarization, as an electrified atmosphere of opposing forces, people begin to regard those who do not think like they do as the enemy. As the intensity of feelings increases, they seek to defeat and even humiliate or destroy one another. Respect for others is lost. The ethic of love gives way to the ethic of hate. I have heard good Christians speak of how much they hate the people on the other side of an issue (p. 2).

More than ever, this world needs Christ followers who commit to the hard and fruitful work of loving the neighbor as oneself. Perhaps we can begin within our own congregations. Part of what I appreciate about the ELCA is that we commit to being the body of Christ together, even though individuals may not feel the same on certain issues.

We hold tight to our baptismal promises and our oneness in Christ, giving thanks to God for the diversity of human beings and creation. And we give thanks to God for our Lord Jesus, "for he is our peace; in his flesh he has made both groups into one and has broken down the dividing wall, that is, the hostility between us ... In him the whole structure is joined together and grows into a holy temple in the Lord; in whom you also are built together spiritually into a dwelling place for God (Eph. 2.14, 21)."
