GOD'S WORK, OUR HANDS Sunday, September 12, 2021

A big shout out of gratitude for all of the many hands that helped with the GWOH event this year. This year's 8th annual GWOH event was certainly worthwhile and absolutely fun and productive.

Here's a listing of the many activities that the Social Ministry Team coordinated with the congregation's help:

- Twenty Birthday Bags were assembled and delivered to W.E.A.V.E. for their residents. Each bag contained cake mix, frosting, candles, and five handmade greeting cards with postage stamps.
- Highway Roadside Cleanup was completed. Seven hardy souls collected a
 dozen bags of trash from the roadway for the two-mile stretch from the boundary
 with Custer State Park west to the Dakota Greens Nursery. This year's big finds: a
 door stop, a witch's leg AND a \$10 bill (deposited in the collection plate for added
 karma!)
- In the weeks leading up to GWOH Sunday, our CLF quilters focused their efforts toward making dozens of quilts for Lutheran World Relief as well as for W.E.A.V.E.
- Our brethren with green thumbs are independently working on weeding the Healing Garden at the Hospital.
- Congregants wrote many cards and letters of gratitude and support to our military.
- Baskets of healthy snacks were assembled for our hospital's healthcare
- professionals, each with a sticker of support, gratitude and a promise of our continuing prayers. Cards of thanks were written and distributed with the baskets as well. The Social Ministry Team is planning to follow up the baskets with meat and veggie trays for the hospital in the days ahead.

"Imagination is more important than knowledge. Knowledge is limited. Imagination encircles the world." Albert Einstein

I recently attended the annual SD Synod Fall Theological Conference in Pierre. The speaker this year was Dr. Sam Giere, a professor at Wartburg Seminary. He spoke about imagination, the lack of imagination, and shared this quote from Albert Einstein.

I found this quote fascinating because I always think of Einstein as a very logical, mathematical man, not given to flights of imagination. But I suppose if he didn't have a wonderful imagination, he never would have discovered all the amazing things he did.

It made me think of how often we get so stuck in what we think we know, what we believe, and what we think will happen, that we can't see anything else. We can't imagine anything else. We lose that amazing gift of imagination.

It feels like that is especially true since the beginning of COVID-19. It feels like everyone is stuck in "what used to be" and wanting to get back to whatever that was. We feel depressed or discouraged because things are not the way they used

to be, and we wonder if they ever will be.

But I think that's the wrong question. I think the question should be, "What new and exciting things are possible now?" How can we use our imaginations to see new possibilities for ministry now? What new people does God want us to reach out to? Who needs to hear about God's love for them, and our love, too?

Rather than be discouraged, let us open ourselves up to the Holy Spirit leading us in new ways and into new ministries. Maybe that means not as many people will be sitting in the pews on Sundays or Wednesdays, but it may mean that we are

touching people's lives outside of worship in powerful and meaningful ways.

I invite all of us to imagine – to dream – of where God is leading us at Custer Lutheran Fellowship in this continued time of uncertainty. Where will God use our gifts and talents here in Custer and in the wider community? The possibilities are endless if we open our minds and imaginations to the possibilities.

HEALTH MINISTRY

PARISH NURSE UPDATE BY MARY KLEIN

Stand Up to PAD (Peripheral Artery Disease). Leg Pain is not Normal!



PAD affects 1 in 8 people over 60. In Diabetics it is 1 in 3! PAD increase your risk for Heart attack, stroke and limb loss. The most common symptom is "claudication" which is cramping, fatigue, pain or discomfort in your legs, and buttocks caused by poor circulation. It is a common and potentially deadly disease and if left untreated can progress to gangrene and limb loss. It is especially common in diabetics and those with advanced kidney disease. For that reason esp. if you fall in those categories, make sure your provider does a foot examination, and have toenails clipped by a Podiatrist.

Other signs & symptoms include a temperature difference between one leg and the rest of your body, burning or aching in your feet & toes while at rest with your legs up, cramping in the hip, thigh or calf muscles, redness or color change in an arm or a let, slow growing toenails and slow or non-healing sores on your toes or feet.

If these symptoms show up, it is very important to be evaluated by your provider.

How can you prevent PAD?

- *Don't smoke or use tobacco products
- *Lose weight if you are overweight
- *Know your cholesterol & blood sugar numbers and keep them well controlled
- *Control your blood pressure and take your medications as directed
- *Stay active and exercise 3-5x a week
- *Eat a heart healthy diet, use lo-fat products and limit sweets, sugar-sweetened drinks, limit salt, processed foods and meats

Treatment is focused on life style changes including a healthy diet and exercise program, medications and if severe, revascularization procedures.

MENTAL HEALTH UPDATE

It has been great to begin to see more high profile people coming out about their own mental health issues. There are so many more people who live with these issues daily, than anybody realizes. There is still such a stigma involved in mental illness & treatment. Hopefully with more people being open & honest with others about these issues we will lose some of these stigmas. 

We met at the pavilion at Outlaw Ranch for our meeting in September. Larry Peterson was our speaker. Pastor Larry talked about the history concerning the native Americans and special use of Outlaw, by some folks from Woyatan, that came to spend time there during the summer. The Black Hills are a special place for all of us and especially to those who are part of the Lakota culture. We all know that Outlaw is special place in the hills. It became even more special to many folks as it was used as a true retreat center.

It was a very interesting and delivered with heartfelt emotion. A huge thank you to Pastor Larry! We always learn so much when he speaks to us.

W/ELCA provided items for the backpack program at the elementary school during the last half of September. We packed items for 200 backpacks to be distributed to the students who needed them. Thanks to all who helped pack items. It was a great team effort!! The backpack program provides food for students to use over each weekend during each month. Different organizations in the community take a month during the school year to make this program possible. The Storehouse helps fund this program.

At our August meeting, motions were made and passed to give \$300 to help folks in Haiti who had suffered loss from the earthquake and hurricane that had occurred there. In the same way, we gave \$300 to folks in Tennessee that were affected by the seventeen inch rain fall that occurred there in August. We also asked that at least part of the noisy offering in September would go to Haiti and Tennessee. The use of the noisy offering became our mission project for September.

Our mission project for October and November is The Storehouse. There will be cards with the list of items to be collected on the collection cart in the narthex.


GENTLE YOGA CLASSES


