We are so excited that once again this year CLF will be participating in a nationwide Day of Service in our community. ELCA churches from around the country will be a visible witness of the faith on **Sunday**, **September 8**th as members step outside of the church doors and into the community to serve our neighbors. Our Sixth Annual "GOD'S WORK. OUR HANDS." Sunday will be held on September 8th

Our focus this year will be on service projects that benefit our community. Our plans include:

- Trash Pick Up around Stockade Lake (5 to 8 volunteers) as well as in ditches along the road into the town of Custer (8 to 10 volunteers)
- College care packages and military notes of appreciation (4 to 8 volunteers) •
- Quilting •
- Assisting flood victims with clean-up (4 to 6 volunteers per site)
- Installing acoustic ceiling panels in the CLF basement (5 to 6 volunteers with hand tools)
- Assembling birthday celebration bags for persons at the W.E.A.V.E. shelter • (4 to 5 volunteers).
- Nursing Home visits & service at 2:30 PM after Ice Cream.



ACTIVE SHOOTER/SAFETY TRAINING

Deputy Matt Tramp will be holding an active shooter and safety training here at CLF on <u>Saturday, Sept. 28th from 8:00 am – 12:00 pm</u>. He will be training us using the **ALICE** system – Alert, Lock Down, Inform, Counter, Evacuate. It is so important to be prepared in the highly unlikely event that something would happen here, especially in worship. This is not only for leadership or ushers in the church, but for everyone in the congregation. This is training that you can use anywhere you go - grocery shopping, at a restaurant, on vacation, everywhere. There will be class time and then we will have hands-on training as well. There was a wonderful paragraph in a Gather magazine Bible Study from July/ August last year that I just have to share. It's called **A Job for "Anybody".**

There was an important job to be done and Everybody was sure Somebody would do it. Anybody could have done it, but Nobody did it. Somebody got angry, because it was Everybody's job. Everybody thought Anybody could do it, but Nobody realized Everybody wouldn't do it. So Everybody blamed Somebody when Nobody did what Anybody could have done.

I love it because it's so true! We all, myself included, assume that someone will jump in and do whatever is being asked. Maybe we feel like we don't have time, or maybe it's that we feel like someone else would do a better job than we would, or maybe we're afraid to try something new in case we fail. So we don't volunteer – we don't jump in and say, "I'll do that" or "Sure, I'll try that." And it doesn't get done.

This Bible Study was all about conflict and reconciliation – stressing that we've all been chosen to fulfill Jesus' mission to work for peace and reconciliation, and so we've been called to be the Anyone who will jump in and do whatever is required of us to create peace.

That doesn't just apply to reconciliation, though. So often, we think that there are plenty of people to do all the things we as pastors and staff ask people to do. So we don't take that step forward. It can be hard and challenging and intimidating to try something new, or to push through our own insecurity to say, "Yes I'll try." But God is the one who has chosen you to fulfill his mission; God gives you the power and the gifts you need to do the work God is calling you to do.

And that applies to everything in our lives, not just church. Whenever we are given the opportunity to be part of something that will help others, or help our environment, or stand up and speak out for the oppressed, be the one to say, "I will be there! I will help!"

And next time we ask for Someone to volunteer for something at CLF, be the Anybody who does it, trusting that God – and we – are here to support you and help you be who God created you to be!

Forum on Sanctuary Church Body Decision

The <u>15th Churchwide Assembly</u> for the ELCA, of which we are a part, was held in Milwaukee in August. The churchwide assembly is the highest legislative authority of the ELCA. Over 900 voting members from all 65 synods participated in the weeklong triennial assembly to discuss and deliberate important matters of the Church. One of those topics which you may have heard about through national news outlets was the decision to declare the ELCA as a "<u>sanctuary church body</u>". Information about this decision and what it does and doesn't mean is at the Welcome Center at the church.

I would like to offer CLF the opportunity to discuss this declaration. I will facilitate a forum about it <u>between services on September 22nd and 29th.</u> If you are excited about it, come. Thursday morning, August 22nd, three people from CLF and two from the Woyatan Re-Entry Program were off to prison. Cozy Dorton and Woyatan Re-Entry board members Glenn and Marlene Sellevold from CLF, along with Hanna Fleming, Director of Woyatan Re-Entry, and Jim Bishop, also a board member, from South Canyon Lutheran Church, were on our way to the State Penitentiary in Sioux Falls to visit the St. Dysmas worship service there.



This has become an annual trip. Every Thursday evening, St. Dysmas has a worship service for the inmates. Usually, outside church members from various churches will also worship with them. St. Dysmas is a member of the ELCA. The service is led by Pastor Wayne Gallipo. The inmates must sign up ahead of time to attend the worship service. We heard their Praise Band, their Choir, and a sermon from Pastor Wayne.

We were greeted by the church council when we entered the sanctuary. We had a chance to visit with the inmates before and after the church service. This is a time for the men to feel as if they are not in prison! It is also a time for us visiting to get a feel of what they fee inside. It is truly a blessing for all!

Visitors worshiping with the guys will say that it is one of the most spiritual experiences they have had! The inmates we worshiped with that evening were there because they truly wanted to be there. They gave up their last day of outside rec for the year to attend church that evening. We were thanked individually many times for driving 400 miles just to worship with them! The St. Dysmas Congregation really appreciates CLF's support.

THURSDAY WOMEN'S BIBLE STUDY

This evening Bible study will resume on <u>Thursday, September 12th</u>. We meet each week at 5:30 PM. In this past year, we have studied *Women of the New Testament*, *Meeting the Spirit*, and *Fruits of the Spirit*. It is so wonderful when we hear Pam preaching on a passage and think "Oh, we talked about this in Bible Study!"

Participation in the group is designed to be fluid. New members have joined throughout the year; existing members take breaks for travel or other priorities and then jump back in when schedules allow. There is a closeness and trust that is developing among us as we discuss and ponder God's Word together. And, even more importantly, we are experiencing God's blessing of spiritual growth.

We resume in September with a study on the Gospel of John. Members have the opportunity before the meeting to read a short Bible passage (less than one chapter) and ponder responses to a list of 8-10 study guide questions. In the meeting we re-read the passage out loud and talk about our responses to the questions. The questions are framed to elicit closer reading of the text and personal reflection. Participation in discussion is voluntary. There aren't "right" or "wrong" answers. We are finding the dialogue to be very spiritually rich. If members don't have time to read the lesson ahead of the Bible study, that's OK.

You don't need to be a biblical scholar, or even particularly familiar with the Bible, to participate. As Pastor Pam says when serving communion, "All are welcome here".

When you stimulate the pressure receptors under the skin, the heart slows down, food in the digestive track is absorbed into our bodies better and serotonin (a feel good hormone) is released into the bloodstream.

Human touch can ease pain, help with infant growth, promote better sleep, reduce irritability, increase socialization, and help with depression.

Human touch enhances a sense of well-being, lowers blood pressure, lowers the stress hormone, cortisol, gives comfort and reduces sadness. Human touch can increase our happiness and joy. I could go on and on. **Don't be afraid to give that joy, peace and happiness to others**.



COUNCIL MINUTES - AUGUST 20, 2019

Treasurer's and Finance Committee Report—The council reviewed the treasurer's report. The strategies developed by the Finance Committee to address a potential shortfall were presented and discussed. While contributions during July were 97% of budgeted expectations, the year-to-date contributions are at 93.45% with a projected shortfall of \$22,726 for the year.

- The recent Properties Expertise Meeting led to a priority of maintenance projects with repairing of the leak in the basement deemed the top need. It was moved, seconded, approved that quotes for spending up to \$7,500 to repair the leak in the basement wall be honored.
- + It was moved, seconded, and approved to spend up to \$1,000 for crack seal in the parking lot. Larry Noem has volunteered to coordinate the crack project which will require 5-6 volunteers on a Saturday morning. Rosemary will contact Larry authorizing him to get supplies.
- + There are issues with the boiler for the sanctuary wing which will require some more work to determine the best path forward.
- + It was moved, seconded, and approved to authorize a contract for propane at \$1.21 per gallon for a locked in, year-round price with McGas.

Unfinished Business:

- + **Thrivent Choice**—Received in August —\$0; received \$1,901 year to date.
- + Amazon Smile—\$8.09 received in August. Received \$23.25 year-to-date.
- + Attendance/Financial Statistics were reviewed.
- + **Properties Meeting**—Held August 15. See Treasurer's Report. Meeting was very productive.
- Parking Lot Evaluation —See Treasurer's Report. Larry Noem had evaluated and determined that the chip and seal could be put off for one to two years as long as crack repair was done this summer.
- + Update on the Surge Protection for well pump and electric panels: This is complete as Elmer Smolnisky has hooked them up.
- + **Removing Hazardous Limbs** Aim High Tree Service has been contacted and will provide service when they are in Custer.
- + **Safety/Security** A meeting between Matt Tramp and Pastor Pam is scheduled. A training for the congregation will be held in the near future.

New Business:

- + Membership Changes—Scot and Mary Hoscheid were welcomed on July 28.
 - **Discussion on Worship Service Times** Pastor Pam has determined it is time to develop a committee to thoroughly review all aspects of one service vs. two services. This will include a survey monkey as well as one-to-one discussions with members of the congregation.
- + A sink hole/drain pipe—was brought up, with safety concerns noted as it is close to the playground. Pastor Pam will further investigate this with Augie Heyne.

Reflections on Mission and Ministry—Pastor Pam reported she had attended a meeting regarding emergency preparedness and will be part of a new group, Custer Disaster Response Team, which will be a nonprofit organization under the auspices of Custer Ministerial Association. She also enjoyed her vacation time. *Committee & Ministry Team Reports:*

- + Evangelism and Social Ministry Teams—are working together on the 'God's Work. Our Hands.' day scheduled for September 8, 2019.
- + Worship and Music—Pam met with musicians for the Fall season. Council members want to again thank musicians and volunteer musicians that provide such wonderful music.
