#### BLESSING OF BACKPACKS



#### PARISH NURSE NOTES BY MARY KLEIN, RN PARISH NURSE

We continue to have elevated numbers of people contracting COVID. That is expected with our population growing during summer from tourism. With the virus continuing to develop new strains through mutations the virus always tries to outsmart us. People



continue to get ill. Thankfully most are down for only a few days, but there are a number of people getting very ill and dying from it. I have a personal experience with this. My 60 year old sister-in-law who is rarely ill and no known risk factors developed COVID. Within days she needed to be hospitalized in the ICU with Heart failure. It was so serious they were preparing for a heart transplant. In the interim she was kept alive basically on a heart bypass pump for about 5 days. We were all very concerned she would not make it. Miraculously she began improving, (I credit many prayers), and looks like she will be alright. Not all the stories end this way. Please, please, get your vaccine and/or boosters. They are probably coming out soon with an updated vaccine booster which works better on our recent mutations. If you have concerns talk to your doctor. Healthy body, healthy life

# Mental Health Update By Mary Klein, RN Parish Nurse

I'm not sure how many of you read Governor Noem's article a recently on the ways our state is planning to address the Mental Health of our state. They have been working on developing ways to get the help out. Curious, I went to the website BeThe1SD.com to see what they are putting in action. They are researching the prevalence and subgroups of people who need help. They have developed an action plan to work on educating our school systems on Mental Health identification and plan of action. They are also developing resources for the person in crisis. They also have most of the information needed to help someone in crisis including a chat site for someone in crisis. It explains how the new **Suicide Prevention Hotline (988) works** and what kind of help to expect. There are other resources for family members and those who want to help. I ordered a tool kit and pamphlets which I should be getting in a few weeks. I will get them out for people to take home and I will also have many of the resources they are providing. Healthy mind, healthy soul.

#### MESSAGE FROM YOUR CLF TREASURER

Time for an update on CLF's fiscal status for the first seven months of 2022. In compliance with 2022 Annual Meeting Approvals, the mortgage at First Interstate Bank has been paid off. The only debt CLF now carries is a 10-year fixed-rate (5.375%) unsecured loan for \$81,229.06 from the ELCA Mission Investment Fund with a monthly payment of \$917.80 CLF expenses thus far this year have come in slightly under budget. Per annual meeting decisions, this amount includes funds set-aside for capital improvement and any unspent youth coordinator salary.

CLF offering contributions through 7-31-2022 have fallen short of budget by \$25,000 (15% below budget). It is possible with the beginning of fall activities in September members will have an opportunity to catch up on their pledges and the situation will improve. The council monitors the budget on a monthly basis and will keep the congregation informed as CLF finishes the 2022 calendar budget year.

### **SD SYNOD NEWS**

#### 2022 CHURCHWIDE ASSEMBLY HIGHLIGHTS

The sixteenth Churchwide Assembly of the ELCA met August 8-12, 2022, worshiping together in services of Eucharist and lament, experiencing a liturgy rooted in Indigenous traditions, and hearing a public apology in a non-legislative session to Iglesia Luterana Santa Maria Peregrina for harm experienced from actions taken by the Sierra Pacific Synod and this church. The following key actions were taken by the assembly:



- Elected Mr. Imran Siddiqui of the Southeastern Synod as vice president of the ELCA.
- Directed the Church Council to establish a Commission for a Renewed Lutheran Church to reconsider statements of purpose for each expression of this church, the principles of organizational structure, and our shared commitment to dismantle racism, with findings to be reported to the 2025 Churchwide Assembly in preparation for a possible reconstituting convention' and directed an external audit of the governing documents of this church to consider diversity, equity, inclusion, and accessibility, with findings resulting in recommended changes to the governing documents.
- Authorized revisions to the social statement, Human Sexuality: Gift and Trust, and approved exploration
  of reconsideration of the four stated positions of "bound conscience."
- Encourage members, congregations, and synods of this church to educate themselves about Indigenous
  peoples, calling on the churchwide organization to work with synods and Indigenous partners to identify
  sources of funding for ministries for Indigenous peoples, and encouraging restorative justice that could
  include return of land to the appropriate Native nations.
- Referred a proposed study of pay gaps for rostered ministers to the Church Council.
- Mandated a review process of the roster manual and policies related to specialized ministries, On Leave from Call status, and protocols for removal from the rosters, and encourage bishops and synod councils to use sparingly the process of removal from the roster for non-disciplinary reasons.
- Approved the budget proposal for the triennium, including a spending authorization of \$68,814,000 for 2023 for the current fund, along with spending authorization of \$22,930,000 for ELCA World Hunger.
- Affirmed limits on the use of non-disclosure agreements by the churchwide organization and urged synods, congregations, and other ministries to apply the same limits.
- Reaffirm the commitment of this church to reduction of greenhouse gas emissions, directing the churchwide organization to set a goal of reducing net greenhouse gas pollution 50% by 2030, with a long-range goal of achieving net-zero emissions by 2050.
- Called for a review of the nomination and elections process used by synods and the churchwide
- organizations. Responded to memorials, including among others those on diversity; nuclear weapons; voting rights and Washington, D.C., statehood; strategies for fortifying urban ministries; a Black migrant strategy; the right to boycott; gun violence; LGBTQIA+ welcome; substance abuse; Roe v. Wade; remembrance of Armenian, Assyrian and Greek genocide; parental and medical family leave' a process for pre-identification f nominees for the office of presiding bishop; revisions to the mission development process; consideration of communion practices related to remote worship; a affirmation of the task force created by the Church Council to review the discipline process; and a social message on child abuse and protection.
- Approved or ratified amendments to the Constitutions, Bylaws, and Continuing Resolutions of the ELCA,
  Most of which were related to general clarifications and updates; inclusive language; synod-authorized
  ministry; designation of advisory members by the Church Council; boards of the separately incorporated
  ministries; and election procedures for officers and the Churchwide Assembly.
- Elected members of the Church Council, Committee on Appeals, Committee on Discipline, Nominating Committee, and boards of the Separately Incorporated Ministries [see "First Common Ballot Results"].

#### FEEDING SOUTH DAKOTA FOOD DISTRIBUTION BY DONNA MCCONNELL

Feeding South Dakota's COVID response in 2020 was to close their distribution center to the public and then deliver boxes of food to communities throughout the Black Hills as mobile food pantries. Feeding South Dakota



started bringing boxes of food to Custer during the summer of 2020 once a month for distribution to the community. The truck pulls up and unloads the boxes of food. Typically, each family receives approximately 75 pounds of fresh and frozen produce, dairy, meat, breads and other non-perishable food items. Families pull up in their car, get checked in, and then



the volunteers load the boxes straight into the cars. Storehouse and community volunteers have been showing up for this distribution shine or snow to partner with Feeding South Dakota.



These food box distributions have continued on the second Tuesday of each month since 2020. The number of families has continued to grow so the distribution moved from The Storehouse parking lot to the Buffalo Ridge Resort parking lot to accommodate the growth. The number has grown from 40-50 families at the beginning to currently 150-170 families each month. 
When the Custer Senior Care Center was open, CLF pastors, musicians, and parishioners led the worship services there, including communion, every three months on a Sunday afternoon. After it was determined in 2022 that we could return, Pastor Pam and a few of us were able to enter the facility and provide services again for a couple of turns. Then, the decision was made to close the Custer Senior Care Center. We responded with sadness and anger for families and residents to be on the search for a place for their loved one to live.

Throughout this time, Sandy Huffman was Activities Director at the Nursing Home. When that closure occurred, she and other staff were transferred to Wedgewood, an assisted living facility near the older hospital and the former nursing home. If you are not familiar, 343 North 10th is the address — on the way to the Custer football and track complex.

Sandy called this summer and asked if we could come on the second Sunday of each month — not as a complete service, but as a singalong. We went on July 10th and it was enjoyable. Some stayed and had lemonade on the patio with JoAnn Evans. Things didn't work out in August, but we are now scheduled for the second Sunday in September, which is September 11th ... a perfect activity for us to share on "God's Work, Our Hands" Sunday.

On September 11th, CLF will be very busy fulfilling the promise of "God's Work, Our Hands" as they provide and serve a meal to all our Custer County First Responders. It is one way we can express our gratitude for the protection and caring services they provide for our community. There are sign up pages where help is needed; they are at the Welcome Table.

#### MONTHLY SATURDAY MEN'S BIBLE STUDY BY ALLEN CANETE

If you asked the average Bible-believing Christian when the last time they read the book of The Revelation, you might get responses ranging from "never have", to "I have, but didn't understand it" to "it's important, so I read it".

It's too easy for us as Christians to skip over this important book of the Bible, with all its mystery, symbolism, destruction, doom and gloom and apocalyptic writing. But, we are reminded that, "Blessed is the one who reads the words of this prophecy, and blessed are those who hear it and take to heart what is written in it, because the time is near." (Revelation 1:3). This is the only book of the Bible that promises a blessing to both the reader and the hearer who, "takes to heart what is written in it". On that basis, Revelation is probably one of the most, if not the most important book/letter for us to study to increase our knowledge and faith in Christ.

By reading Revelation, if all we walk away with is confusion and fear, we are missing the whole point of the amazing work of God to save his people and "make all things new" that is revealed in this book of the Bible.

Our focus this Fall continues with the final three of the seven "Letters to the Seven Churches", which are all found within the first three chapters. These letters are sort of like the "epistles of Jesus" penned by the Apostle John, the beloved disciple, "whom Jesus loved", and who leaned on Christ's breast during the last supper. This same John who witnessed the events surrounding the Lord Jesus on the mount of Transfiguration, but this time the vision described in Revelation that he has of the Risen Christ is even more glorious,---that it literally slays him. "When I saw Him, I fell at His feet as though dead."

In each of the letters that the Lord instructs John to write, there is a familiar pattern. Jesus usually gives a commendation, but also the problems indicated by "what I have against you", and an exhortation and a promise to the overcomer. In each case, these seven churches have different challenges and issues going on within, whether a lack of devotion (Ephesus), persecution (Smyrna), false doctrine (Pergamum) or worldliness (Thyatira). The last three churches He addresses are Sardis, Philadelphia, and Laodicea, which we will cover in September through November. Some Bible scholars also are quick to point out that each of the churches are prophetically representations of the different historical progression/regression within the Church Age. It is an interesting observation that we have just touched briefly on.

Even though these letters were written to churches that existed over 1,900 years ago, the message to the churches are also for us today. Much can be gleaned and lessons learned from these churches and how their problems and issues are the same for us today. These letters are like report cards that help all the churches know and understand the trials and tribulations of long ago and also today; and what we should be doing to address them and stay focused. (Hint: it always involves a stronger commitment to and a closer walk with our Lord Jesus Christ).

In addition to studying these letters to the seven churches, the rest of the book of Revelation reveals that it is really a book of hope for us as believers. It dares to look at the evil in this world and the evil ruler of this age squarely in the face and still proclaim that great "nevertheless" of faith and victory that is ours now, and will be forever in Christ. Revelation reminds us that we are really more like colonists from the future, the age that is to come, and the things that we experience in the sacraments and the liturgy are actually from "the kingdom that is to come", that we now live in, in this present world in which we are the real "aliens".

Following the study of the letters to the churches, a study of the remaining chapters 4 - 22 in Revelation is an undertaking that would require more in-depth time, study and commitment, if people so choose and are ready and interested, and would be well worth the future study.
